

Information leaflet for girls aged 5-11

What is a study? A research study is something you do when you want to answer a question.

What is this study about?

This project is about the cream doctors use to treat a problem in the area around your wee pipe (your vulva). The cream has medicine in called steroid. Your body has its own steroids too. If you have a lot of steroid medicine your own steroids might not work as well, and you may feel ill.

The question we want to answer is does the cream affect your body's steroids?

Why have you asked me to help?

You have been asked to help in this project because you have been given cream to put on your vulva.

What happens in this study?

If you and your parents agree to help with this project, the team ask you to collect some of your spit. You will chew on a special cotton wool ball and then your parents will put into the freezer. Your parents will tell you when to do the sample, you have to do it before you clean your teeth and before breakfast. We hope you can give us 9 samples. Don't worry, we don't want them all on the same day!

Do I have to take part?

No! It is up to you, just say if you don't want to take part, we won't mind.

What if I don't want to do the study anymore?

If you don't want to do the study anymore, just tell your parents, your doctor or the people doing the study. You can stop at any time you like, we won't mind.











Are there any risks to taking part?

We don't think there are any risks to taking part in this study.

Why is it good to help?

The study may help children like you in the future.

Can I change my mind?

Yes, you can choose to not help with the project at any time, and you do not have to say why.

What will happen to the results of the study?



After the study, we will write a report about what we find. Let us know if you want to hear about the results.

Who are the people running this study?

The doctor in charge of the study is Miss Harriet Corbett, she is a surgeon at Alder Hey.
