Group 2 Patient Sheet The information sheet will be the first page of an Online survey link (survey.ac.uk) sent to mothers who have expressed an interest in attending the coaching intervention.

Online Mums' group: Coaching mothers of children with sensory integration difficulties: A collaborative service development. A prefeasibility study.

We are exploring better ways to support mothers of children with sensory integration difficulties (SID) based on current evidence and feedback from mothers themselves. This group will help mothers to identify areas of concern in everyday family life and to develop strategies and techniques to address them. Learning and supporting others within the group is part of this process. At this stage we are developing this approach therefore Mothers taking part in the group will also be helping to shape future groups for others, by giving feedback about the group itself and the questionnaires used to evaluate it.

Who is carrying out the study?

My name is Susan Allen. I am an occupational therapy clinician and lecturer, and am currently completing a PhD at the School of Psychology and Clinical Language Sciences, University of Reading, with Dr Fiona Knott (f.j.knott@reading.ac.uk) and Dr Amanda Branson (a.branson@reading.ac.uk). The focus of my PhD is working towards improving services for families of children with SID.

What do I need to do?

 Consent form and demographics: In the first instance, you will be asked to complete a consent form (below). Then there will be a questionnaire that asks you about yourself and your child. The survey will allow you to navigate forwards and backwards and pause at any time until you have finished it. The survey will take



approximately 10 minutes to complete. Participation is voluntary. You have the right to withdraw at any time.

- 2. Pre-session questionnaires: You will be contacted by Sue Allen who will share details of the pre-session questionnaires. We will ask you to complete a Sensory Processing Measure for your child, and a questionnaire about your child's participation in daily life. We will ask you to identify what you would like to get out of the group. We will also ask you to complete forms about your level of stress and how competent you feel. These questionnaires can be completed online or face to face.
- 3. Mums' group: You will be sent an invitation to attend an online MS teams group from 9.30 to 11am on Monday. The group will be attended by up to 6 mothers of children who present with sensory integration difficulties that affects everyday life. You will be invited to share your experiences and identify areas of everyday family life which you would like to change.

We know that, when mothers gain understanding and are empowered, the outcomes for both themselves and their child improve. The role of the occupational therapist will be to facilitate you in problem solving rather than telling you what to do, this is also known as a coaching approach.

We plan to record sessions to check that the researcher has followed the coaching process correctly. We will audio record any feedback given at the end of the final session. The recordings will be held on the University One Drive and deleted at the end of the study.

4. Post group questionnaires: Following completion of the group, you will be asked to repeat the pre session questionnaires. Finally, we will ask you to complete an online survey on what was helpful and how you think the group could be improved for other mothers in the future.

Will your information be confidential?



Yes. The online survey platform has end to end encryption. Your replies from the online survey will be downloaded anonymously onto an Excel spreadsheet which will be stored on the University One Drive. Any paper forms will be digitised and destroyed once uploaded. Uploading of information will be through the Primary Investigator's password protected computer, then stored on the University One Drive. No information about your identity or the identity of your child will be shared. Information provided will be stored securely and reviewed annually after the completion of this study in line with university guidelines, other than video recorded information which will be deleted at the end of the study. This application has been reviewed by the University Research Ethics Committee and has been given a favourable ethical opinion for conduct.
