



From womb to world Study Summary



What is the study about?

We want to understand how babies begin to learn language, and whether hearing gentle, womb-like sounds can support preterm babies' language development.



Why has my baby been invited?

Your baby was born between 26 and 34 weeks, and you mainly speak English at home.

What happens if we take part?

At home



You wear a small audio recorder for 4 days.

In hospital



A small speaker outside the incubator plays gentle womb-like sounds and your filtered recordings to your baby.

Visits to the BabyLab



4 visits over 6 months, where your baby looks at images on a screen while hearing sounds.

Do we have to take part?



No, taking part is completely voluntary.

Are there any risks?



No known risks. The main inconvenience is the time commitment.

Will I receive any incentives?



As a thank you, you will receive a £20 voucher per BabyLab visit and a small gift for your child.



My data

In this research study, we will use information from you and your child. We will only use information that we need for the research study. We will let very few people know your name or contact details, and only if they really need it for this study. Everyone involved in this study will keep your data safe and secure.

We will also follow all privacy rules. At the end of the study, we will save some of the data in case we need to check it and for future research. We will make sure no one can work out who you are from the reports we write. The information pack tells you more about this.

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


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
