# What will I have to do?

Do an assessment
The <b>researcher</b> will <b>assess</b> your <b>language</b> (when you <b>join</b> the <b>study</b> ). It will take <b>5-10 minutes</b> .
 Complete some questionnaires
Fill in some <b>questionnaires</b> about your <b>health</b> (when you <b>join</b> the <b>study</b> and <b>6 months</b> later). It will take <b>30-60 minutes</b> .
Fill in a <b>questionnaire</b> about the <b>therapy</b> after each session. It will take <b>5 minutes</b> .
<b>Tell us</b> if you need <b>help</b> . We will <b>help you</b> .
Take part in observations
Your <b>speech and language therapist</b> will <b>video record</b> your <b>therapy</b> sessions.
<u>Or</u>
A researcher will watch <u>one</u> of your <b>speech and language</b> <b>therapy</b> sessions. This will happen if there are any <b>problems</b> with the <b>video recording</b> .
We would like to <b>find out</b> about how the <b>therapy</b> works in <b>practice</b> .
Access to your medical and care records
We would like to <b>find out</b> about;
The type of stroke you had.





	How your health has been affected

# What happens if we can't meet in person due to the COVID-19 pandemic?

But, We will not visit if it is not safe. We will not visit if you do not feel comfortable.
We may <b>use</b> an <b>on-line platform,</b> e.g. <b>Microsoft</b> <b>Teams</b> or <b>Skype (</b> for <b>questionnaires</b> and <b>interviews).</b>
We will help you to <b>access</b> on-line <b>platforms</b> . We will have <b>regular breaks</b> .





#### Do I have to take part?
